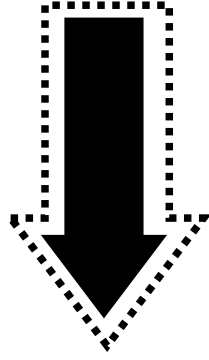


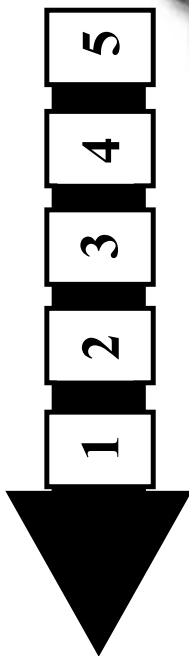
**Directions:**

1. Color the game board and pie chart these colors.  
1-blue 2-green 3-yellow 4-red 5-orange
2. Cut out the spinner, the cards, and a wild blueberry for each player (above – add colors)
3. Attach spinner to the wheel with a paper fastener, place wild blueberries on black starting box, and place cards upside-down in the square.
4. Spin the arrow for 5 seconds with your eyes closed and move your wild blueberry to the next box of that color, until there are no more boxes that color and you can move to the black finish box. You're the winner!
5. When you land on a blue box pick a Wild Blueberry card and read aloud.

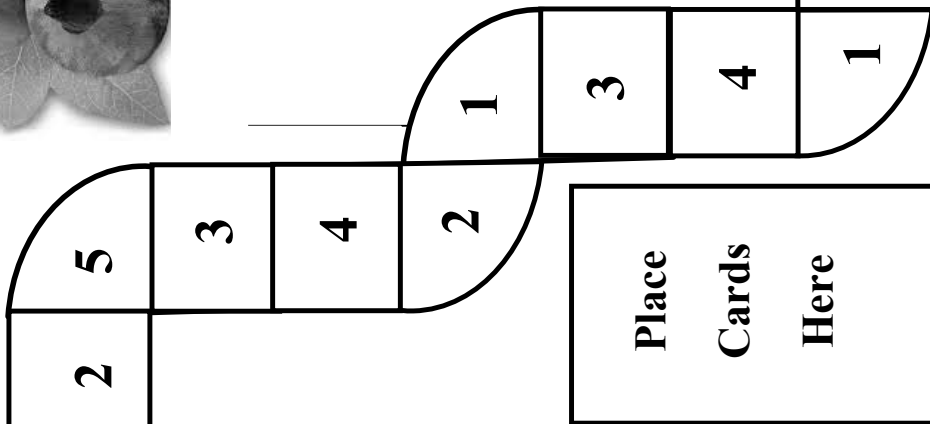
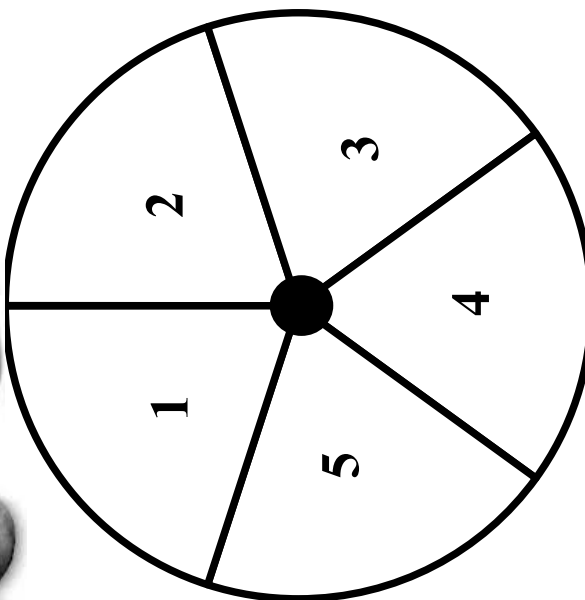
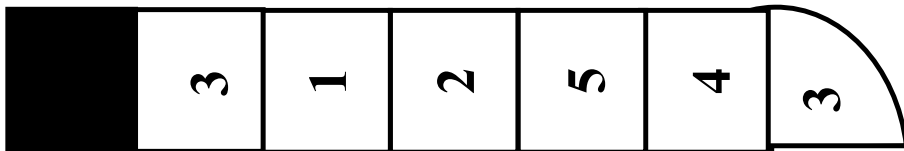
